Engineers of Co. A, 70th Engr BN (Cbt), accustemed to drilling, cleaning, and filling petholes on QL-21 have had the tables turned on them with the arrival of a three man dental team from the 93hth Medical Detatchment (Dental Service). Now it is the engineers' turn to have a few "potholes" in their teeth filled.

The dental team, headed by Capt. Melvin J. Weissburg, D. M. D., arrived at Co. A on 16 June and immediately broke out their sophisticated equipment and make set up shop in the officers' living quarters, a twenty by thirty foot bunker. "We transport all of our equipment man in four large suitcase type containers and two footlocker sized cabinets", explains Capt. Weissburg. The man dental apparatus is specifically designed for use in the field and is easily adapted to most any type of surroundings whether it be a tent, sea shack, or bunker. "The only element that must be supplied by the unit in the field is electrical power", states Capt. x Weissburg.

The dental crew is often forced to rely on "field expedients" in their work. For example, a five gallon can serves as the running water supply while a .50 caliber same box is used as a wash basin. Despite the crude surroundings the patients receive the same high quality of dental care available in stateside clinics. The occasional soldier that requires major dental work is referred to the 98th's dental clinic in Nha Trang.

According to Capt. Weissburg approximately 80% of the "en" examined require some dental work, primarily filings, kin while about one fourth of kenathese shows a pressing need for dental attention. By keing having dental care available in the base camp, "A" Co. engineers are saved the wasted man hours that would normally be mx used in imma transit to and from established dental centers.
